

## Report on the activities of The Oxford Centre for Methodism and Church History, 2021-22.

## <u>General Updates</u>

#### 1.1 The Past Year

2021-22 has been another productive year for the Centre. The Coronavirus Pandemic has continued to have an impact on our working practices; and on the types of outputs we are able to achieve. In spite of this, 2021-22 has also be an extremely successful year for the Centre. We have been able to host, organise, and attend both online and in-person events; return to primarily working on-campus; and engage with others as part of work with individuals and visiting groups. We have been able to welcome researchers back to our Reading Room, and also to visit other archives or heritage sites as part of our wider work and research.

The Centre continues to work with an increasing number of external partners, ranging in involvement from The Methodist Church and The Westminster Society; to The Manchester Wesley Research Centre and Wesley House, Cambridge; and newer partnerships, such as with The Methodist Insurance Company, and Southlands College (University of Roehampton). We continue to also work with, and to support, our collection owners, working closely with the Avec Consultancy Trust regarding the development of their archive; with the Methodist Philatelic Society over the deposit of their collection, and financing of a new bursary; and, as ever, with the Wesley Historical Society, with a focus on the growth and development of their collections and space allocation, particularly at this time of transition for the Society.

Digitisation and online engagement continued to play an extensive, and growing, role in our work this past year - with almost 2,000 additional items now available online, and over 1 million views have now been achieved across our online collections.

External to their work with the Centre, staff remain involved with several different initiatives, ranging from the production of local newsletters (Forsaith), through to serving as the Youth Commissioner for their local Scouts district (Dobson). Notably, Professor Gibson serves as a council member of the Oxfordshire Records Society, and is currently involved in arranging their AGM and book launch, both of which will be held at Harcourt Hill in October 2022, and will also include an exhibition of some of the Centre's holdings.

This Report serves to illustrate much of the hard work completed by the Centre this past year, and also the impressive impact this is having - particularly in an increasingly digital field.

In July 2022, the Centre Administrator, Rachel Atkins, left her role at the University. We are very grateful for all of her hard work whilst in this role, especially during the difficulties of the past two years. Rachel was especially efficient, and excellent at ensuring that Centre staff were informed about changes and updates within the wider Faculty. Her role is currently vacant whilst a successor is recruited.



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
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## **Collections**

## 2.1 Use and Development

#### 2.1.1 Use of our Collections

Whilst in-person use of our collections is relatively low following the Centre's reopening after lockdown, engagement with our material remains high. The uses of our collections have been outlined below. (This does not include online engagement, nor engagement by staff or Dr. John Lenton, the Honorary Librarian of the Wesley Historical Society until July of this year.)



#### 2.1.2 Collections Development

Whilst the primary Collections Report is generated and submitted to the Westminster College Oxford Trust in March, to accompany the completion of updated information relating to their insurance, it seems appropriate to include reference to their development in this Report. Collections which have seen improvements to their storage, and/or access, include:

- The Westminster College collections
- The Wesley Historical Society collections
- The sketchbooks of Evelyn Dunbar
- The Smetham Collection
- The Hudson family collection
- The archive of Dr Francis Bartels.

Most notably, 2021/22 saw the glazing of 'Westminster College' (John Piper, 1948), which was funded by a private individual. We have also had the Westminster College portrait of John Wesley by Kate Gray (great-great granddaughter of Charles Wesley) reframed, enabling it to be displayed.

In addition to this, several collections are now more extensively listed or fully catalogued. These lists and catalogues both assist staff when discussing the further development of collections, and in enabling access to material by researchers when the collections lists and catalogues are finalised.

Despite 'retiring' from his role as Honorary Librarian of the Wesley Historical Society this year, Dr John Lenton continues to work on the development and listing of their archive holdings. Assisted by Centre staff, and the overall sorting of all of our collections, the Wesley Historical Society has now been able to create a single archives collection in the main Centre stacks.

The Centre would also like to reiterate our thanks to Dr Lenton for all his work as the Honorary Librarian of the Wesley Historical Society, a role he has held since 2002. He remains on as 'Assistant Honorary Librarian, with the main librarianship now held by Dr Clive Norris.

#### 2.2 Exhibitions




Image: One of the exhibitions created by Oxford Brookes Art History students, May 2022.

The return to work at Harcourt Hill, as well as a return to in-person events, has led to an increase in the number of physical exhibitions it has been able to host. Six exhibitions have been organised in the past year in addition to those created by Curatorial Practice students.

These exhibitions were:

• 'A Celebration of Westminster', September-October 2021

Created to accompany the Westminster Society Reunion.

#### • 'The Library at 50', October 2021

An exhibition exploring the history of the Westminster College Library created to mark the 50th anniversary since the opening of the new Library on 20 October 1971.

- 'An Act of Remembrance', November 2021 Created to accompany the Service of Remembrance in the Westminster Chapel, this exhibition looked at some of the Westminsterians who engaged with war primarily the First and Second World Wars.
- 'An Archival Advent'. December 2021
  An exhibition created to accompany the Centre's
  #ArchivalAdvent on Social Media, this exhibition
  displayed some of the more rare items from our
  collections, as well as those with a festive theme.
  - 'Treasures of the Centre', February-March 2022

Created to accompany the Oxford Brookes Applicant Day, this exhibition displayed some of the more famous items from our collections, as well as those which best show the breadth of our holdings.

• History of Art 'Curatorial Practice' exhibitions (six exhibitions), April-May 2022

These exhibitions were curated by Level 5 and 6 students around six themes of their choosing. The artworks had been selected by Dr Forsaith and Tom Dobson for the students. The themes selected by students were:

- 1. James Smetham and the Natural World
- 2. From Matron to Matriarch: The women from history
- 3. James Smetham: Methodist and Artist
- 4. The Life and Lost Works of Evelyn Dunbar
- 5. Missionaries and their Involvement in Colonisation
- 6. Calm and Chaos: Illustrating Climate Change

Works selected from the Methodist related collections include 'An Indian Woman' by Agatha Hellier (Methodist Church House collection); 'Seems to have forgotten about me' (a satirical cartoon from the collections of the Wesley Historical Society); Mrs. M. Scott (the Westminster College collection); 'Thomas Birch Freeman' by David Grice (Methodist Church House collection); and 'The New Room four ways', a photographic composition by Sheona Beaumont (The Centre collection). 'Calm and Chaos' will be recreated to accompany the Westminster Society Reunion in September 2022. An illustrative selection from this exhibition was also recreated in the Art UK 'Curations' tool, and has since been used in an Art UK session as an example of effective use of this tool.















• The John Wesley Lecture, 24 May 2022

To accompany the John Wesley Lecture, which was delivered by Dr Tim Underhill on the Wesleys and their use of shorthand. This exhibition was a display of items from the Wesley Historical Society collections, as well as the collection of glass plate negatives created by Nehemiah Curnock (The Curnock Slide Collection, OCMCH).

• An exhibition to accompany the Ecclesiastical History Colloquium

Themed this year around 'Art, Religion and Commerce, c1750-c1950', this exhibition included material from the Smetham and Dunbar collections, as well as some relevant books from the Wesley Historical Society Library.







#### Smetham at 200: A Bicentenary Project



This had been deposited at Westminster College in 1996, and was bequeathed to Oxford Brookes in 2016 through the Capital Tax exemption scheme. The pandemic, and lack of access to the collection, has prevented this from becoming a reality, but has led to several online exhibitions. Dr Reed and Lizzie Barrett (Visiting Research Fellow 2020/21) have created two digital exhibitions around the bicentenary. The first, 'James Smetham Timeline (Part 1)', explores the life of Smetham; whilst the second, 'The Rose of Dawn: an Introduction to James Smetham', provides a more in-depth exploration of James Smetham as a person.

September 2021 marked 200 years since the birth of James Smetham. Smetham was the inaugural Drawing Master at Westminster College, and his wife (Sarah) was one of the first infant teachers at its Practising Schools. The Centre had originally intended to create a travelling exhibition to commemorate this, drawing mainly on its Smetham Collection.





A highlight of this bicentenary project, has been the discussions it has triggered. Sarah Middleton's 'Lifted' course, for example (which she ran with Wesley House, Cambridge during Lent 2021), has led to discussion of the use of art as a reflective tool among those who attended her course. It also positioned James Smetham alongside more famous artists, such as Vincent Van Gogh and Unity Spencer, and used his art (which had often been his method of dealing with stress and mental illness) to discuss these topics more widely. Similarly, Tom Dobson's blogposts for The Methodist Church (first for their festive series in 2020, and then as part of 'My Justice Journey') have led to a wider appreciation of the Smetham family and their work.








A wider awareness of James Smetham and his work, as well as the Centre's collection, led to his great grandson visiting the Centre in October 2021. Pictured here are four generations of the Smetham family: Rev. James Smetham; his son, James Smetham (the artist); his son, John Smetham; James' great grandson, Martin Peppiatt; and Martin's grandaughter, Annie. During their visit, the Peppiatt family were able to view the entirety of our Smetham collection, and to discuss the work we have been doing.






Most interestingly of all, however, was the material they brought with them. Texts held within our collection, for example, makes reference to a small copy of The New Testament which had been annotated by James Smetham using "squarings" (his most recognisable artistic output), and the Peppiatt family brought this volume for us to look at.



They also own another volume of James Smetham's "Bible Studies", which was compiled by Sarah Smetham in the early twentieth century. Identical to ours in every way, this volume precedes the squarings found in our volume, and contains further books of The Bible, showing that Smetham proceeded further with his aim of squaring the entire Bible than we had previously thought. The Peppiatt family have since loaned this volume for us to photograph.

## <u>Digital Presence</u>

## 3.1 Wordpress and Cataloguing

Increased work on our collections has been facilitated by expanded cataloguing and listing, which provides greater public access to our holdings. Cataloguing achievements include the complete listing of the archive of Dr Francis Bartels by Dr Forsaith. This listing is now available on the Centre's Wordpress site, and all books in this collection can be found on the main Oxford Brookes Library catalogue (which has recently undergone a slight development, and now lists the repository of all centre material as 'The Oxford Centre for Methodism and Church History'.) Tom Dobson continues to work on the development of the Westminster College archive, which has recently been facilitated by the additional work of one of our Visiting Research Fellows, Dr Jane Platt. He is also working on the archival material held by the Wesley Historical Society, having expanded their storage space in the past year through the relocation of the Avec archive to D4, thus creating a bloc of twentieth century Methodist archives. Material listed from the WHS archives include the archives of John Bowmer and Geoffrey Milburn, as well as the research papers of Alan Turberfield on John Scott Lidgett.

A recent listing completed by Tom Dobson records all material held by the Centre which predates 1750 - a list which details over 120 items from across the Centre's collections - primarily the holdings of the Wesley Historical Society, supplemented by material from the Centre Collection, and the Westminster College archive. If expanded to cover the lifetime of John Wesley (d.1791), this list would include an estimated 1,000 items.

The Centre's Wordpress site continues to expand and grow as Centre activity diversifies. Dr Reed continues to oversee this, and ensure that it reflects the ongoing activity and work of the Centre. Recent additions or changes include the inclusion of the published catalogue for the Avec archive ((c) Avec Resources Trust); regularly updated blogpost entries; and the addition of the Smetham bicentenary digital exhibitions, which Dr Reed co-curated. In the past academic year, we have added a further nine blogposts, reflecting a wide variety of Centre work and interests. The Centre's website has received 4754 views to our website this year.

#### 3.2 Social Media

Twitter continues to be the Centre's primary tool for social media engagement, which is supplemented with material shared on the Centre's Instagram account and YouTube channel. 2021/22 saw the Centre's Twitter followers surpassing 400 for the first time. Overall, we have generated 278 Tweets; received profile views; and generated 25,274 'Impressions'. Our most "popular" month was June 2022, with 12,000 'Impressions' received. Our top Tweet was posted in October 2021, and shared the news of a letter from Hilary Clinton acknowledging her receipt of a copy of Women, Preachers, Methodists, published by the Centre. It received 47 'likes' and 6 'retweets'.

Some of the Centre's most popular tweets highlighted updates to our collections; celebrated our research and recent publications; and allowed the Centre to take part in national commemorations, such as LGBT+ History Month in February. Extended social media campaigns included 'Archival Advent' in December; and the Centre's inclusion in The Methodist MyJusticeJourney campaign, during which the Centre was allocated a day to explore stories of justice from among its collections.

We highlighted the work of Methodist women within education; their historic role in national decision-making; and also the possible injustice surrounding an attempted expulsion from Westminster College in the early 1910s. This campaign allowed the Centre to collaborate with other Methodist historic collections in Britain - namely Epworth Old Rectory; Englesea Brook Museum of Primitive Methodism; and The New Room, Bristol - as well as individual Methodists who chose to get involved and share their story.

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#### 3.3 Digitisation

#### **British Methodist Buildings**

In the past year, 226 images have been added to the collection, bringing the total to 11,622. These images primarily come from the Brinkley albums, which were transferred to the holdings of the Wesley Historical Society from Epworth Old Rectory in 2019, as well as community donations. To date, 13 contributors have added 477 images.

The collection has been viewed 610,600 times; with 119 images have been "faved", and 71 images have received comments.









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#### **OCMCH** Digital Collections

Digitisation has continued to be highly productively during this period, and we have engaged the Oxford Duplication Centre to reproduce more items we were unable to digitise ourselves. They have received 407,000 image views, and with the following being some of the additions which have been made to OCMCH Digital Collections:

#### **ArtUK**

The Centre continues to engage with ArtUK, the national catalogue of artwork in public ownership. The Centre is a Partner of ArtUK, which provides several benefits to us including the ability to amend our art holdings through this catalogue as necessary. Following another extensive round of photography last summer, the Centre has added items to this catalogue, increasing representation on this platform to include 208 works of art, representing the majority of the original works held by the Centre, as well as a number of other artworks held by Oxford Brookes. This profile, therefore, includes works of art such as 'Self Portrait' (James Smetham); 'Westminster College' (John Piper); all nine of the College Principal portraits; the Westminster College Grant of Arms; and the 'Alpha' and 'Omega' panels (Evelyn Dunbar). In addition, ArtUK also ended a three-year sculpture project in 2021. This increase to their overall scope and coverage saw the addition of sculptures to all collections on ArtUK, including six sculptures at Oxford Brookes - four of which are at Harcourt Hill (the two 'Christ and Child' statues; the bust of Sir James Yoxall; and the coade stone bust of Rev. John Wesley). With ArtUK, the Centre now offers the sale of high quality prints of artworks from the Smetham and Bletchley Park College collections (both of which are owned by Oxford Brookes University). The Centre is currently investigating the sale of printed items (such as tote bags and mugs) through this shop, as well as the addition of further works from its holdings.

#### YouTube

The Centre's YouTube channel continues to grow, now hosting a further five videos; and with 49 subscriptions. Our videos have now amassed 56.6 hours watch time. The following additions have been made to the Centre's YouTube channel:

## <u>Public Engagement</u>

#### 4.1 Our Events

The Centre also organised the Annual John Wesley Lecture (in partnership with Lincoln College, Oxford; and Wesley Memorial Church, Oxford), and was delivered by Dr Tim Underhill on 'The needles of the friends': the Wesleys and shorthand.' The Centre also organised the first post-lockdown Ecclesiastical History Colloquium around an overall theme of 'Art, Religion and Commerce'. It included papers by:

• Dr Matthew Craske (Oxford Brookes University):

Another Enlightenment: Painting, Sculpture and the promotion of Christian experience in Georgian England

• Tom Dobson; Dr Reed; Sarah Middleton

The Bicentenary of James Smetham, Pre-Raphaelite

• Peter Vass (Independent Scholar)

Getting out of Whitechapel: Jewish identity and modernism in the lives and art of Mark Gertler and David Bomberg in the early twentieth century

• Sandy Brewer (Independent Scholar)

The Sunday School paintings of Elsie Anna Wood and other women artists 1930-1950. A movement from a "two-eyed stance" to the "beholder's share"

• Jan Cox (Independent Scholar)

Stanley Spencer: Nativity, Crucifixion, Resurrection.

The event was attended by 19 people in-person, and 21 online attendees.

Both of the bi-annual Methodist Studies Seminars were held online this year. The December Seminar was held on 11 December 2021, and was organised by St. John's College, Durham around a theme of 'Methodist Ecclesiology and Mission in Times of Transition'. The May Seminar was hosted by Wesley House, Cambridge on 21 May 2022 around a theme of 'Methodist Theology in a World Parish'.

## 4.2 University Engagement Activities

In addition to an increase in the amount of work the Centre carries out with students and/or as part of academic modules, the Centre has also engaged in a varied of other public engagement activities. These include introductory tours to our collections for Sarah Hollingdale (The new Methodist Heritage Officer); Ashley Cushman (the new Academic Library Liaison Officer); Dr Abbey Halcli (Interim PVC Dean of the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences); Dr. Jan Davison-Fischer (Interim Head of the School of Education); and Professor Lucy Mazdon (new PVC Dean of the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences). A visit to the Centre was also made by Helen Cameron, Secretary of the Avec Trust. Further university engagement activities include:

• An introduction to the Sketchbooks of Evelyn Dunbar for members of staff who teach on the History of Art programme, as well as the two Learning Resources staff members who care for Oxford Brookes' Special Collections.

#### 4.3 Stakeholders

The Centre's engagement with Church activities continues to grow. Dr Forsaith and Tom Dobson attended the Methodist Artefacts Group meeting at Methodist Church House in December 2021 (where the historic objects stored here were discussed prior to the removal of The Methodist Church from this site), as well as subsequent meetings of this group. Dr Forsaith continues to be a member of the Methodist Heritage Committee, and the Methodist Church Listed Buildings Advisory Group. He has been particularly involved with Listed Buildings projects at Holt (Norfolk) and the New Room, Bristol. Professor Gibson attended the two-day, in-person meeting of the Trustees of Epworth Old Rectory in March 2022.





In addition, Professor Gibson; Dr Forsaith; and Tom Dobson attended the reopening of Wesley Memorial Church, Oxford following construction of its new heritage atrium. Opened in March 2022, this atrium features heritage exhibitions, as well as permanent photographic features exploring origins of the Methodist Church in Oxford, as well as how the Methodist Church flourishes in the City today, through a series of 'lenticulars' mounted on the wall. Some of these feature works held by the Centre (or other copies of works held by the Centre), as well as featuring Tom Dobson on two of the panels.

#### 4.3.2 The Westminster Society



The past academic year has also seen a great deal of engagement with The Westminster Society. The first large event of the academic year, as well as post-lockdown, for the Centre was the long-awaited Westminster Reunion and BA Celebration, which was jointly organised by the Society and the Centre.

The BA Celebrations that took place during the day recognised the award of BA degrees by Oxford Brookes University to 517 Old Westminsterians who had earned the three-year Certificate in Education whilst studying at Westminster College. The Rev Miriam Moul lead her first service as Chaplain in The Westminster Chapel; addresses by Dr Susan Howdle and Dr Roger Dalrymple (now Professor of Education; and interim Associate Dean of Education); and an after-dinner lecture delivered by Rev. Dr. Ralph Waller KBE.



Following the success of last year, The Westminster Society and Oxford Brookes University reopened the scheme to allow further Old Westminsterians to apply for a BA. This scheme closed in April 2022, and a further 80 awards have been made.

At the Society's AGM, its membership formally agreed upon a new constitution for The Society, with Tom Dobson now serving as an ex-officio member of the General Committee of The Westminster Society (as a representative of the Centre).

Outside its relationship with The Society, the Centre was also pleased to publish a blogpost by Derek Gillard, an Old Westminsterian, as part of LGBT+ History Month in February. This blogpost explored what Derek's experience had been as a gay student at Westminster College in the early 1960s.

The Society's annual magazine, *The Westminsterian*, was published in February 2022, with two articles produced by Centre staff. Dr Peter Forsaith wrote 'Francis, Igniter of Fires', which looked at Dr. Francis Bartels, whose archive Dr Forsaith has finished cataloguing this past year.

Tom Dobson wrote 'All roads lead to Oxford: the hunt for the perfect second home for Westminster College'. This piece draws on information learned in the process of his PhD research, and highlighted the many different sites considered as a second location for Westminster College ranging from Hull and Leicester to Headington Hill Hall.

Tom Dobson also provided several images which featured throughout the magazine - either photographs he had taken whilst attending The Westminster Society Reunion; photographs which he had accessioned into the College archive as a reflection of the BA Celebration; or images which already featured in the College archive.

The Westminsterian, as always, was designed by Oxford Brookes University, with postage funded by the University. Spare copies of the magazine were distributed by the Centre.



Methodism and its Impact, for example (which includes papers by Gibson and Dobson), was edited by two PhD students at the University of Essex, providing them with experience in editing a text for publication, as well as providing several of the authors included with experience in writing and editing a paper for inclusion in a published volume.





## 5.3 Research Spotlight



#### Seely and Paget

In 2019, the Centre opened the Harcourt Hill campus as part of the 'Oxford Open Doors' weekend. This celebrated both the 60th anniversary of the site, and the architects behind it: Seely and Paget.

In February 2020, Dr Forsaith hosted a meeting at the English Heritage offices in London. This was attended by others interested in Seely and Paget, including members of their families. Although the pandemic halted much work on this project, Oxford Brookes Faculty Research funding allowed Dr Forsaith to resume work on this project, working towards the centenary of the firm in 2026.

The Faculty research grant enabled Dr. Forsaith to visit a number of properties Seely and Paget (or their firm) designed and spend two periods listing and scanning original archive material which will contribute to further awareness and understanding. The first of a series of bi-annual newsletters has been produced, to be followed by a website. A publication aimed at the popular heritage market is planned and also doctoral research. As interest grows in the architectural transition between tradition and modernity, from the 1920s to the 1960s, as well as in the history of social/sexual relationships, Seely and Paget are of increasing interest.

For the Centre, this growing interest carries three key benefits. Firstly, this research is of interest to colleagues in other departments of the University, and is successfully drawing our collections to their attention. It is having a similar effect externally, with English Heritage; Historic England; and The National Trust developing an interest in Seely and Paget. Finally, it is successfully highlighting the architectural designs and creations of Seely and Paget - both internally and externally - as buildings of interest, thus generating interest in the campus.

#### **OCMCH** Research Bursary

Following the deposit of the 'Methodist Philatelic Society' archive with the Centre in 2021, a generous donation has enabled the Centre to create a research bursary. Aimed at, but not limited to, students, this bursary aims to support research and engagement with the Centre's collections. This bursary will be awarded twice annually, with the first recipients being Oxford Brookes PhD students, Tom Dobson and Deborah Hartland. A third award will be made to Thomas Restall (a postgraduate at Wycliffe Hall) following the completion of his Masters (2021/22) and entry to a doctoral programme (University of Oxford from 2022).

#### 5.5 Students



In the past academic year, Centre staff have supported activity spanning the entire length of the 'student journey', with activities ranging from hosting a stand at Brookes Applicant Days, to assisting with the delivery of modules and supervision of research students, to attending Brookes

Graduation ceremonies.

In February, Tom Dobson and Dr Forsaith attended the Oxford Brookes Applicant Day at Harcourt Hill, supporting colleagues from across the University at this recruitment event - the first held at Harcourt Hill in several years. This event saw students, and their parents, who were interested in studying courses in the Schools of Education, and English and Modern Languages attend taster sessions, as well as being given the opportunity to talk to colleagues from Finance: Learning Resources; and Accommodation.





Professor Gibson and Dr Reed attended the Graduation Ceremony of Dr John Harding in June 2022, John having received his PhD during lockdown.

Professor Gibson and Dr Reed also have a new PhD student. Deborah Hartland started her studying at Oxford Brookes University in 2021, and is researching 'Nurturing faith and identity in the evangelical family, 1760-1830.'

Tom Dobson's PhD research on 'Training to Teach: Westminster College and the Development of British Higher Education in the Twentieth Century' continues to progress, and is supervised by Professor Gibson (Director of Studies) and Professor Bev Clack (Second Supervisor).

Professor Gibson was external examiner for a PhD at the University of Westminster in June 2022 and at the University of Heidelberg in July 2022.

Other engagement with teaching has seen Professor Gibson delivering seminars on the eighteenth century on the University of Oxford MSt/MPhil/DPhil Ecclesiastical History Graduate seminars for the Faculty of Theology of the University of Oxford in February 2022. He has also contributed teaching sessions to the Oxford Brookes undergraduate history module on 'Faith in the West' in March 2022.

Dr Forsaith, Tom Dobson and Dr. Reed assisted with the BA History of Art Level 5 and 6 'Curatorial Practice' module. This included the delivery of a seminar on curating and caring for travelling collections; a practical session on caring for works, which culminated in a three-week exhibition of 36 works selected from the Centre's collections.

Students had to create a theme for their exhibition of six works; arrange and hang the works; and write captions for each image, as well as overall exhibition descriptions, ahead of a private viewing for staff. They then presented their exhibition to the rest of the groups. Dr. Forsaith and Tom Dobson assisted the module leaders in the assessment of these. The exhibition has been permanently recreated in a catalogue, and is now being used as an example for alternative forms of assessment at Oxford Brookes. It is intended that a similar course will run again as part of the academic year of 2023-24.
