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Message from The Director

The academic year 2022/23 has been a highly productive one for the Centre. Staff have participated in over fifty events and the recovery from COVID has meant that we have recorded over a hundred in-person uses of our collections.

Three specific examples of our work deserve special mention as they have potential to really enhance our activities. First, our small publishing venture, OCMCH Publications, saw the production of two new books, Clive Field's Methodism in Great Britain and Ireland: A Select Bibliography of Published Local Histories and Philip Tovey's History of the Local Ministry Pathway in the Diocese of Oxford, available for £13.99 and £10.99 respectively. Future plans include a second volume by Clive Field and collection of essays from the 2022 Methodist Heritage conference.

Secondly, engagement with the wider world on the internet is growing significantly. British Methodist Buildings has been visited by more than three quarters of a million people and our other Digital Collections page has had half a million visitors. Our Twitter page has had 111,750 views.

A really exciting venture is an expansion of our ArtUK partnership to include the new Bloomberg Connects programme. This means that the Centre's art collections will be electronically accessible in the same way that other major art collections are. They will be on the same platform as pictures from the Tate, Guggenheim, the Uffizi, Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York and the Louvre. Daniel Reed and Tom Dobson have worked extremely hard to organise this development and we are sure it will expose our collections to a worldwide audience.

Our events this year have been better attended that ever before. We had a major conference on Evelyn Dunbar, a Christian Scientist and the only salaried woman war artist in the Second World War, which attracted over eighty delegates including representatives from the Ashmolean and the Imperial War Museum. Our annual Colloquium, focusing on new research and publications in ecclesiastical history, was also well attended and attracted very positive feedback.

Looking forward to 2023-4, we have just received back from the Oxford Digitisation Centre 3,500 images from the Curnock glass slides. These are fragile photographic images from the early twentieth century and almost certainly contain some 'lost' manuscripts of early Methodism. It is a great relief to have these images secure for the future, and to begin the exciting process of identifying each item. We also have plans to work with the Old Rectory at Epworth and John Wesley's New Room in Bristol in making their work more widely available, and we are supporting a new Westminster College Heritage project. We are also organising a conference in November, entitled 'Church for Change', which will explore the history of the Methodist Church's commitment to social justice in light of the 'Justice Seeking Church' report to the 2023 Methodist Conference.

In the main body of this report you can see the specific activities of the Centre and we welcome questions and comments on any aspect of it.

Staffing Updates and Changes

In January 2023, Centre staff were joined by Nathalie Chapple, who was appointed as an Administrator for the School of History, Philosophy and Culture, as well as for the Centre. Having previously worked in a local school and as the Events Co-Ordinator at Harris Manchester College, Nathalie brings a good deal of expertise with her, and is proving to be an invaluable asset to the team.

Two staff members were recognised for outstanding performance by the University. Dr Daniel Reed was granted an 'Achievement, Contribution and Excellence' award and Tom Dobson was promoted from a grade 7 to a grade 8 post. Both awards recognise excellence and dedication in their performance for the Centre over a sustained period.

Centre staffing has been stable in the year 2022-23, though we were sorry to say goodbye to Rev. Miriam Moul who has been chaplain at Harcourt Hill and an honorary member of the Centre staff.

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Research Support

Two rounds of Research Bursaries were awarded in 2022/23 - one for autumn 2022, and one for spring 2023. Bursaries were awarded to:

- Nathan Travis (Masters Student, University of Chicago), comparative study of the British and United Methodist Church responses to same-sex relationships and marriage;
- Emma Cresswell (OBU Undergraduate) for support towards her dissertation study on the Pre-Raphaelites.

The autumn 2023 bursary has been awarded to Sarah Middleton in support of her collaborative work towards our Smetham exhibition.

Support of Colleagues

In addition to this funding, the Centre supports the research, teaching, and wider work of our colleagues. In 2022/23, we achieved this through the funding of a semester's teaching release for Dr Hannah Yelin (Reader in Media & Culture), and by allocating funding for 'Girls, Leadership and Women in the Public Eye', a project led by Dr Michele Paule (Reader in Communication, Media & Culture). Of this, Michele said

I am writing to thank the OCMCH for the funding assistance towards my Girls, Leadership and Woman in the Public Eye project, especially the element investigating gender and media examples of religious leadership. The equipment has enabled me to find and show the media figures that girls raise during focus group interviews on the spot as it were, and invite discussion of specific images and coverage. This has prompted more engaged, focused and critical discussion among participants, allowing them to draw quickly on examples from their own media engagements. The equipment also has greatly enhanced capacity to record in real time, producing better and clearer data, both in face-to-face and online (Zoom) interviews.



Event Spotlight: Rediscovering Evelyn Dunbar

On Saturday 22 April 2023, the Centre welcomed over 50 guests (both in-person and virtually) for 'Rediscovering Evelyn Dunbar: a Life in Art' – a celebration of the life and work of Evelyn Dunbar (1906-1960) – most famous as the only woman artist salaried by the War Artists Advisory Committee during the Second World War. Professor Lucy Mazdon (Pro Vice-Chancellor and Dean of the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences) provided an introductory message saying:

"Evelyn Dunbar had many interesting and important associations with our University, so it's wonderful to see her work being celebrated and discussed here today."

Dr Forsaith and Tom Dobson opened the conference, with a brief introduction to the life of Evelyn Dunbar and her links with Bletchley Park College, and a discussion of 'Our Dunbar Collection', with a focus on the sketchbooks acquired and preserved by the Centre in 2021. During the course of the day we heard four excellent papers illuminating different aspects of Dunbar's life and artistic practice; Peter Vass drew from the recently-discovered sketchbooks now in the Centre's collections to provide insights into her juvenilia; Gill Clarke explored Dunbar's illustrations informed by her deep knowledge of gardening and horticulture; Claire Brenard elaborated on Dunbar's connection with the War Artists Advisory Committee, with specific reference to papers and artworks in the collections of the Imperial War Museum; Jan Cox highlighted the importance of Christian Science as the spiritual foundation of Dunbar's life and art.

The day concluded with a round table discussion featuring all speakers, led by Ian Holgate, senior lecturer in the History of Art at Oxford Brookes. This commenced with an address by Christopher Campbell-Howes, who gave an enthusiastic and generous recap of the day's events, which included indications of future pathways of 'Dunbar Studies':

I leave you – you, Oxford Centre for Methodism and Church History – that spark that Peter Vass mentioned, that holy fire, that sacred flame of her work and her memory. Everything that she stood for. And I know that that flame will be well-tended and kept burning brightly.

Papers from this conference have since been added to the Centre's YouTube, and have already gained over 100 views.


OCMCH Publications


The Centre continues to expand and diversify the range of titles offered through OCMCH Publications. In the past year, two volumes have been published, with work underway on a further three works. Volumes currently in production include a collection of essays derived from the Methodist Heritage conference celebrating Hugh Bourne 250, and a biographical study of clergyman and theologian Joseph Bingham (1668-1723) by the late L. W. Barnard.

Our past volumes also continue to receive coverage, and achieve good levels of sales. Women, Preachers, Methodists (our first volume, published in 2020), has been reviewed by Rev. Jennifer Smith in Wesley and Methodist Studies this year. In Vol. 15:2 (Spring 2023), she commented that "this collection is exceedingly good value for a balanced, lively, accessible, and nonetheless academically rigorous offering".

New titles for this year are:

- Clive Field, Methodism in Great Britain and Ireland: A Select Bibliography of Published Local Histories (2022)
- Phillip Tovey, History of the Local Ministry Pathway in the Diocese of Oxford (2023)





Clive Field's volume offers the first systematic bibliography of local histories of Methodism. This important reference work lists around 4,000 of the most important publications on local Methodism from the mid-nineteenth century to the present. They are arranged topographically, according to current civil administrative units, and with a cumulative index of place names. A review of this volume in the *Proceedings of the Wesley Historical Society* notes that 'This impressive bibliography is clearly the result of an unimaginable amount of painstaking work... Given that educational institutions are prioritising local history more than ever before, this bibliography could not have been timelier. Field is to be congratulated on such a fine piece of work.'

Philip Tovey's book looks at the history of theological education for laity and ministry in the Diocese of Oxford. While there are a few histories of colleges, there is almost nothing on reader training and on local ministry. This book tells the story from the inside and includes voices of the participants.



Partners

The Methodist Church

Throughout the past year, Centre staff have continued to engage with a variety of Church related activities, through Connexional committee work, and other diverse activities. Professor Gibson continues to serve as a representative on the Epworth Rectory Trust, attending several meetings online this year, and was only prevented from attending the first post-COVID in-person meeting by bad weather in March. Dr Forsaith and Tom Dobson continue to sit on the Methodist Church Artefacts Group, with most of the focus still occupied by artefacts removed from Methodist Church House following its closure. Dr Forsaith also continues to serve on the Methodist Church Listed Buildings Advisory Committee, with work including site visits and an advisory visit to the new 'Faith Museum' in Bishop Auckland, but has retired from The Methodist Church Heritage Committee following the end of his most recent election. In May, Tom Dobson was appointed to the Methodist Church Archives and Records Advisory Group, and has attended two online meetings.

In addition to these committees, partnership work has been ongoing with a variety of Methodist venues and sites, most notably with Epworth Old Rectory; John Wesley's New Room; and Southlands College, University of Roehampton. The partnership with Epworth Old Rectory has seen the creation of an online exhibition titled 'Ghost or Mischief?'. Using letters by members of the Wesley family, this exhibition explores the haunting of Epworth Old Rectory in the winter of 1716.

Plans have also been developed for the digitisation of artefacts and artwork held by Epworth Old Rectory, and assistance in making these images available. Similar conversations with John Wesley's New Room on the hosting of item transcripts, catalogues and artefact images are also underway. Ongoing conversations with Southlands College, meanwhile, have led to exchanges of information about Westminster and Southlands Colleges, whose work was so closely intertwined in the 19th and early 20th centuries; reciprocal assistance with received research enquiries; and the accepted offer of a large engraving depicting John Wesley's first meeting with George Whitefield in Oxford.

Other Groups

The Oxfordshire Record Society

Having hosted the Annual General Meeting of the Oxfordshire Record Society in October, Professor Gibson has continued to serve on the Council of the Society, and also serving on its Digitisation sub-committee. More recently, Professor Gibson has been leading on discussions around the development of the Society's digital presence, recommending the evelopment of its website, and a more extensive social media presence. In support of this latter aim, Tom Dobson has recently created @OxRecSoc on Twitter, giving the Society a much-needed social media channel.



Oxford Brookes Multi-Faith Advisory Board

Tom Dobson serves as a staff representative on the Oxford Brookes Multi-Faith Advisory Board, and attended two of its three meetings this year, including his first in-person meeting last autumn. In addition to its other work, this Board has spent a good amount of time discussing possible provision of a prayer space at Harcourt Hill specifically for use by the University's Islamic students.

Association of Denominational Historical Societies and Cognate Libraries

Dr Reed has attended each meeting of the newly re-convened Association of Denominational Historical Societies and Cognate Libraries (ADHSCL), which currently has a focus on the sort of activities it could offer, and how to be of most use to its membership, as well as how to grow this body. Most recently, Dr Reed, with Dr Norris (in his role as Honorary Librarian of the Wesley Historical Society), attended a meeting at Faith House in London to give a presentation about the collections held by the Centre, their contents, and the work undertaken by the Centre and Society.

Walking Tours of Oxford

Throughout the past year, Dr Forsaith has continued to offer walking tours of Oxford, exploring their links with Methodism; the Wesley family; and other notable figures, including George Whitefield. In 2022-23, these tours have been delivered to visiting church groups; International MA students from Wesley House, Cambridge; and students from the European Methodist 'E-Academy'.

The Westminster Society

Engagement between the Centre and The Westminster Society continues to grow, reflecting the growth in variety of activity by the Society. In September, the Centre organised the second celebration of awards of BAs for the Society, and created an exhibition to accompany the Society's annual Reunion and AGM. This year, the exhibition featured a recreation of a student exhibition created for the 2022 History of Art 'Curatorial Practice' module.

Society members were invited to the campus Carol Service in December, and have been welcomed by Centre staff on-campus throughout the year.

Tom Dobson serves as an ex officio member of the Society committee alongside Rev. Miriam Moul and the University Alumni Officer. In addition to this, he has also taken on the role of 'Project Lead' for the joint Society/Centre 'Our Westminster College Heritage' project. This project seeks to "Celebrate the contribution to wider society of Westminster College, its alumni and former staff' through the creation, and maintenance of a 'Heritage WestBase' detailing the stories of as many alumni and former staff as possible, and the subsequent publication will contain a selection of these biographies. The '200 Voices' and '200 biographies' volumes produced to mark the bicentenary of the University of Wales Trinity St. David (which contain both Professor Gibson and Tom Dobson) , and 'A School Set Apart' by Gary Best for Kingswood School's 275th anniversary, are both being used as examples.

The timeline for this project is as follows:

- Spring 2023: Project launch
- Autumn 2023: Project Introduction to alumni; Launch of participation survey
- Autumn 2023 Spring 2026: Contributions welcomed; Creation of a Heritage WestBase
- Autumn 2025: Launch of the Heritage WestBase
- Autumn 2025 Spring 2026: Selection for the Publication
- Summer 2026: Editing of the publication
- Autumn 2026: Launch of the publication; Westminster College's 175th birthday

This project was initially launched in *The Westminsterian* (2023), which also featured images from the Centre's collections.

Our Collections

Collections Update

Although overall in-person use of our collections is modest, enquiries into their contents; requests for individual references or quotes, and for high quality copies remain high. This level of requests directly correlates to overall exposure of our material, with requests growing in number after additional release of material online; an event featuring material; or a particularly focused social media campaign. The number of collections now cared for by the collection stands at 25. Shelf space remains at a premium, but further reduction in duplicate volumes held by the Wesley Historical Society, rearrangement where possible, and the purchasing of additional archive shelving for our twentieth-century collections room have all helped to slightly alleviate the space pressures. A full list of these collections can be found at the end of this report.

In the past academic year, one collection has been added to Centre holdings. Originally based on a deposit from Hinde Street Methodist Church in London (donated, February 2023), the Centre created its archive collection for papers relating to the work of the Rev. Dr. Lord Soper (1903-98). This collection was then greatly increased in size and content following a deposit from Lord Soper's daughter. This collection is now in the process of being listed and fully catalogued.


Our twentieth-century collections have seen the greatest development this year, with the completion of the relocation of the Avec Resources Archive; the listing of many of our smaller collections has been achieved; and work on the Colin Morris cassettes by Dr Jane Platt now is also underway. In addition to this work, cataloguing and boxing of Dr Bartels' papers has been completed; our Curnock and Methodist Church House collections have been merged to form one 'Methodist Church in Britain' collection; and all of our art collections have been listed alongside each other for greater monitoring and cross collections use.

New material has been accessioned into the collections of the Wesley Historical Society collection; the Methodist Philatelic Society; and the Oxford Institute for Methodist Theological Studies. The Centre's own collection of books continues to grow steadily, reflecting the varied nature of the Centre's work and study interests.

The greatest growth in collection size has been in the Westminster College archive. Following the University's announcement in October 2022 that it intends to withdraw from activity at Harcourt Hill, departments have begun reducing their holdings. For the College collection, this has seen the discovery of a large body of archival material documenting individual College students and their work, and one box of material relating to the merger between Westminster College and Oxford Brookes University (mostly dating to 1998-2000). The Centre has also begun the data transfer of relevant books and theses on the online catalogue from the Harcourt Hill campus collection into the Westminster College collection book catalogue. These developments greatly expand, and enrich, the College collection.

Collections Use

In the past academic year, our collections have been used a recorded 127 times. This count does not include uses by Centre staff, nor by the honorary librarians of the Wesley Historical Society. This does, however, include use in exhibitions and to support teaching and outreach activity.



Exhibitions

In addition to our digital exhibition, 'Ghost or Mischief?', the Centre has created a further two digital exhibitions with ArtUK this year:

- 'Oxfordshire: An Artistic Tour'
- 'Rediscovering Evelyn Dunbar: Her Life and Art'

In addition to making use of art from Centre collections, these exhibitions are also able to draw on material added to ArtUK by partner institutions. As such, they feature material held by the Imperial War Museum; John Wesley's New Room; Oxfordshire Museum Service; The Ashmolean; Lincoln College, Oxford; and others.

These digital exhibitions prove to be an increasingly important tool for outreach and engagement. The Centre's increased use of ArtUK's variety of tools carries other benefits as well, with ArtUK now offering exposure and assistance through their weekly #OnlineArtExchange; 'Art Unlocked' seminars; and collection assistance on 'Bloomberg Connects', a virtual collection guide.



Preservation and Conservation

Preservation and Conservation remains a key part of the Centre's work. In 2022-23, material from the Westminster College, Wesley Historical Society and Bartels collections have been reboxed. The Soper collection has all been appropriately stored following its accession, and preservation of the Colin Morris collection is ongoing. Five items have received conservation treatment from R&L Lancefield. These items are:


- A newly accessioned 16th-century Bible with extensive annotations throughout

- The first three Westminster College photograph albums


In addition to these items, cleaning of Nehemiah Curnock's glass plate photographic negatives has been undertaken as part of their digitisation.



Newly found Family Bible, c16th-17th centuries.


Before and After Conservation work.

Our Digital Collections

The OCMCH Digital Collections page continues as our primary digital repository, and has now received **516,500** image views.

Other upcoming additions include:

- output from collaborative projects;
- scans of *The Westminsterian* magazine produced by students at Rugby School,
- the extensive Watkinson collection of Methodist manuscripts from John Wesley's New Room, Bristol.

Work is also continuing to make the Wesleyan Teacher Registers available and accessible, with transcription of these underway. The digitisation of Nehemiah Curnock's glass plate slides has also concluded, with 3,508 slides now scanned.

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British Methodist Buildings

In the past year, we have taken more BMB Community submissions into the project, bringing the total number of images to 11,648. Overall, the collection has been viewed 728,800 times - bringing us close to the exciting three quarters of a million milestone. 141 of our images have been "faved", and 93 images have received comments.

We have also received a collection of high quality photographs which originated with the Home Mission department, which were found during the closure of Methodist Church House. We intend to add these to British Methodist Buildings in the coming year.






Audio-Visual Material: YouTube

The Centre's YouTube channel continues to develop as the main outlet for our audio-visual material, including recordings of lectures, and digitised versions of archival items. It now hosts 111 videos, and has 68 regular subscribers.

Popular additions include the 'Wesley's Britain' series by Prof Jeremy Black in conversation with Prof Gibson on the subjects of 'Politics', 'Economy', 'Europe', and 'Print and Authorship'.

Our runaway most popular video is a recording of 'Rejoice! The Lord is King!' made in The Westminster College Chapel in the 1990s, with **2,368** views and **21** likes'.

In May 2023, Tom Dobson delivered an 'Art Unlocked' online talk - part of a regular series developed in collaboration with Bloomberg Philanthropies - which introduced highlights from our collections to the wider ArtUK community. A recording of this is hosted on the ArtUK YouTube channel.

In June, Dr Reed joined colleagues from Dorking Museum, Hampshire Cultural Trust, Munnings Art House, and the Russell-Cotes Art Gallery and Museum online for the first meeting of the ArtUK Partnership: South of England group. This was a really useful opportunity to compare and share professional advice and experiences.

Bloomberg Connects

An exciting new venture for the Centre that has emerged from our ongoing work with Art UK is the opportunity to create a guide to our collections on the Bloomberg Connects app. This mobile-based platform offers users a new, interactive way to explore artworks, and currently showcases over 200 cultural institutions from either side of the Atlantic. The app is completely free to download and use, and Bloomberg Philanthropies offer rigorous training and review of material before going 'live'. We aim to launch the Centre's guide in August 2023.


